Catholic Schools Week 2022 - Thornhill College Celebrations

Inspired by his homily that schools should 'Care, Hope, Pray and Act,' we integrated this message into our activities for CSW. The whole school community took time to pray and quietly reflect during Monday morning by watching the beautiful digital assembly lead by our Year 8 pupils. During this reflection we witnessed the many gifts and talents showing how Thornhill pupils exemplify 'living life to the full' through the shoe box donations, the Hands Hampers, the enrichment crochet class and the wonderful fundraising completed by the Year 13 Mercy and JP2 groups for SVP, Sands and Children in Crossfire.

During Monday the school community also demonstrated their collegiality by departments entering our 'Bake-off' competition. Departments were tasked with baking a cake which best represents their subject and how this contributes to our school community by 'living life a full life'. It was a marvellous turnout and the we were all amazed with the outstanding effort and creativity of our colleagues. Not only did the cakes look spectacular but they also tasted delicious and we bonded together by all sharing slices of these fabulous bakes!
















### Serenity Therapy Services

We are delighted to inform you that we have secured additional support to our counselling service and provision. Ms Roisin Lindsay is a CBT therapist with Serenity Therapy Services here in Derry and has recently joined the counselling support team at Thornhill College.

CBT is an effective intervention for many issues including anxiety, depression, low self-esteem, OCD, PTSD and phobias. As we are aware the well-being and mental health of a student can be negatively impacted due to a number of reasons such as exam stress, anxieties, body image issues, grief and negative self-talk. Therefore, Roisin will work on a one-to-one basis with pupils providing personalised guidance and techniques to assist them.

### The Advice of a Year 14 Student to Year 13 Students

In term one of my final year at Thornhill College, as a Year 14's I have overcome the challenging task of the UCAS process with my peers, with the support of our family, friends and teachers; drafting personal statements, securing work experience and more drafting of our personal statements to reach our end goal. While it initially felt like a huge mountain to climb, now that my personalised statement and choices are finalised, my reference has been written and my application has been submitted, it feels like a blur. If I could go back to the start of KS5, I would definitely have some advice for my younger self. However, as this is impossible, I can share my experience with the year 13's of today instead.

You will hear your careers teachers continually emphasise the importance of securing a range of work experience and, as much as I hate to admit this, it is very important and all the more so to build up your portfolio of experience in Year 13 before you embark on your application in Year 14. Due to the pandemic it has been increasingly difficult to attain work experience, which the universities understand. However, there are a range of online courses you can immerse yourself in to complete virtual work experience and you not let the challenge of finding relevant opportunities stop you from getting where you want to be! I am hoping to study creative writing and English Literature at university and at first I felt disheartened by the lack of online resources to accommodate for my course choices. Because of this, I decided to take matters into my own hands. I did the appropriate research and emailed a number of publishing agencies, authors, poets and even newspaper agencies; I did not receive many responses but this did not stop me from using the resources and contacts I now gained to ask all the questions I had, no matter how stupid I felt they were. So, year 13's, if you don't ask, you don't get – be proactive!!!

I wish I could say that I have soared through my years at Thornhill but keeping on top of work can be a challenge, attempting to find the find the balance between the time commitment needed for studying, extra-curricular interests, part-time work and of course maintaining a social life. But keeping to deadlines and being organised is the best way to stay on track. But despite this, everyone makes mistakes; if you score less than expected on a test; it slips your mind to press "Hand In" on a google classroom assignment; or you bring the wrong booklet to class. It is not the end of the world and you will recover. Focus on how you can do better rather than focusing on where you went wrong!

But how do you prepare/be organised for an exam? Simply, the earlier you start revising, the easier the process will be. Keeping notes updated and organised (using files for each subject, file dividers and sticky notes) will help you find what you need efficiently and keep you right. Making sure you do your notes over time will reduce the amount of writing approaching your exam so you can focus on actually learning the course content. Use the specification as your study guide, the exam board cannot ask you anything that is not on that specification!

Some words of encouragement from current Year 14's:

Lily and Hannah from 14E say to "Do a variety of work experience to explore your options."; "Use your free lessons wisely."

Ellena in 14H advises you to "Start your personal statement when your careers teacher tells you to and volunteer over the summer when you have the free time to do it."

Mary from 14H warns you that "The jump from year 13 to year 14 is significant." (Keeping up with your work and studies will ease the process).

Róis in 14E reminds you to "Stick to deadlines especially if you are an Art student!"

Finally, don't let yourself get carried away with the worry of all that needs to be done, you will get there in the end, make sure you enjoy the journey as well, while it lasts. Seven years flies by and those life-long friends you have made will all follow their own paths, doing so many different things. It may seem scary now, but everyone is in the same boat. So enjoy what is left of your school years but be excited for what is to come!

### 50 Years On From Bloody Sunday

### Contribution by Year 14 Student Róis Hutton – to an article published in the Belfast Telegraph

Bloody Sunday feels "a lot more distant to her generation and less of a threat" as everyone her age was born after the Good Friday Agreement.

However, as a history student she studied the Troubles in detail alongside 100 young people. "We learned about Bloody Sunday and its place in the recent history of Derry and Northern Ireland more generally. That makes us 100 more young people who can help the city heal and move on from the horrible events of that day," she said.

"Bloody Sunday still has the power to divide people in Derry, as on one side of the river there was graffiti condemning the soldiers during the trials while on the other side Parachute Regiment flags flew high on lampposts to celebrate what they did."

Issues such as Brexit have a greater impact on how young people see the future, Róis explained. The lack of leadership shown at Stormont in dealing with bread and butter issues and policing have more impact on how they view the Executive.

"That is not to say we are not aware of the Troubles, nor that we are insensitive to the awful impact it had on countless people all around us. Hearing stories of the Troubles is something that comes with growing up in Derry, whether you want to hear them or not.

"It is vitally important that we do not forget the people whose lives were lost on that day in January 1972, nor the very many people affected by their loss.

"Perhaps the most important reason for remembering is that we learn from the past, and heal from it, and make sure that we never let anything like it happen again."

Laura McGeady, Year 8, finished in 6<sup>th</sup> place and has qualified for the Ulster Championships.


